Dear Center Cass Parents and Guardians –

Thank you for your support of our upcoming Adaptive Pause.

This weekend is an **extremely important** weekend for D66. We would love to provide Center Cass students with one more week of in-person learning inside our schools, but **we need your help**.

Community transmission continues to rise, which is the reason we are planning our pause. Two new remote learners have been reported as positive for COVID-19 (case 23 and 24). We also have a new case at Lakeview Junior High (case 25).

Students and employees are safe when they are inside our buildings, which are sanitized and require social distancing as well as masks. With that said, when students or employees enter the buildings with the virus from the outside, although we are masked and distanced for protection, it obviously increases the risk of spread. Although we quarantined a class once as a precaution, and asked a couple teachers to quarantine after a positive staff member case, there is no indication or evidence of COVID-19 transmission occurring inside our schools, and we need to keep it that way for the safety of our students and employees, as well as their loved ones.

If this weekend you, your children, or anyone you have been in contact with experience any symptoms, please do not send your child to school. Please err on the side of caution. Never send your child to school pending a test result, even if they are asymptomatic, and you are testing them for “peace of mind” just in case they may have “picked it up somewhere”. Please follow the 3 W’s this weekend and **be extra careful** in everything you do. We are advising all employees the same.

We feel extremely fortunate to have been able to provide in-person learning for as long as we can. We want to ensure that everyone stays healthy for Thanksgiving.

Dear Center Cass Parents and Guardians –

Three new positive cases have been reported to us. Case 23 and 24 are remote learners who have not been in the building this year. Case 25 is a student at Lakeview Junior High. No person has met the definition of a close contact outlined by the Illinois Department of Public Health. Below is a joint letter from DuPage Health Department and Local School Districts when a low risk case is identified.

*At this time, the Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) and the DuPage County Health Department (DCHD) are closely monitoring COVID-19 in Illinois to assess exposures and the level of risk to individuals who may have been exposed. Based on the information known and guidance from Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), this has been determined to be a **low-risk exposure**. For persons without illness in the category of low-risk contacts (e.g., being in the same indoor environment [e.g., a classroom, a hospital waiting room] as a person with COVID-19 for a prolonged period of time but not meeting the definition of close contact), **there is currently no movement restriction beyond social distancing recommendations**. Although your risk of COVID-19 from this exposure is considered to be low, in the setting of a pandemic with widespread community transmission in Illinois, you are asked to **self-monitor** for the following symptoms:*

- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fever
- Muscle pain
- Chills
- Headache
- Repeated shaking with chills
- Sore throat
- New loss of taste or smell

If you develop fever and or cough or shortness of breath within 14 days of this exposure, please do the following:

- Stay home while ill (self-isolation). Practice social distancing by avoiding public places and gatherings.
- Contact your health care provider to determine if medical evaluation is needed. Since COVID-19 illness is mild in 81% of persons, you may not need to be seen or tested. Please do NOT show up at your provider's office or the Emergency Department without calling ahead.
- Do not travel on commercial conveyances, such as airplanes, trains, subways, and buses, until you are no longer symptomatic.

Actions to help prevent widespread COVID-19 illness have been implemented nationally, and we encourage Illinoisans to continue to monitor and take steps to protect their health. Some actions you can take to help keep you healthy, reduce exposures to COVID-19, and to slow the spread of the disease include:

- Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Stay home when you are sick, except to get medical care.
- Cover your coughs and sneezes with a tissue.
- Clean frequently touched surfaces and objects daily.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom; before eating; and after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing. If soap and water are not readily available, use a hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol.
- Cover your mouth and nose with a cloth face cover when around others.
- Plan ahead for situations such as closure of schools, daycares, workplaces, and other public locations.
